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From the Executive Director

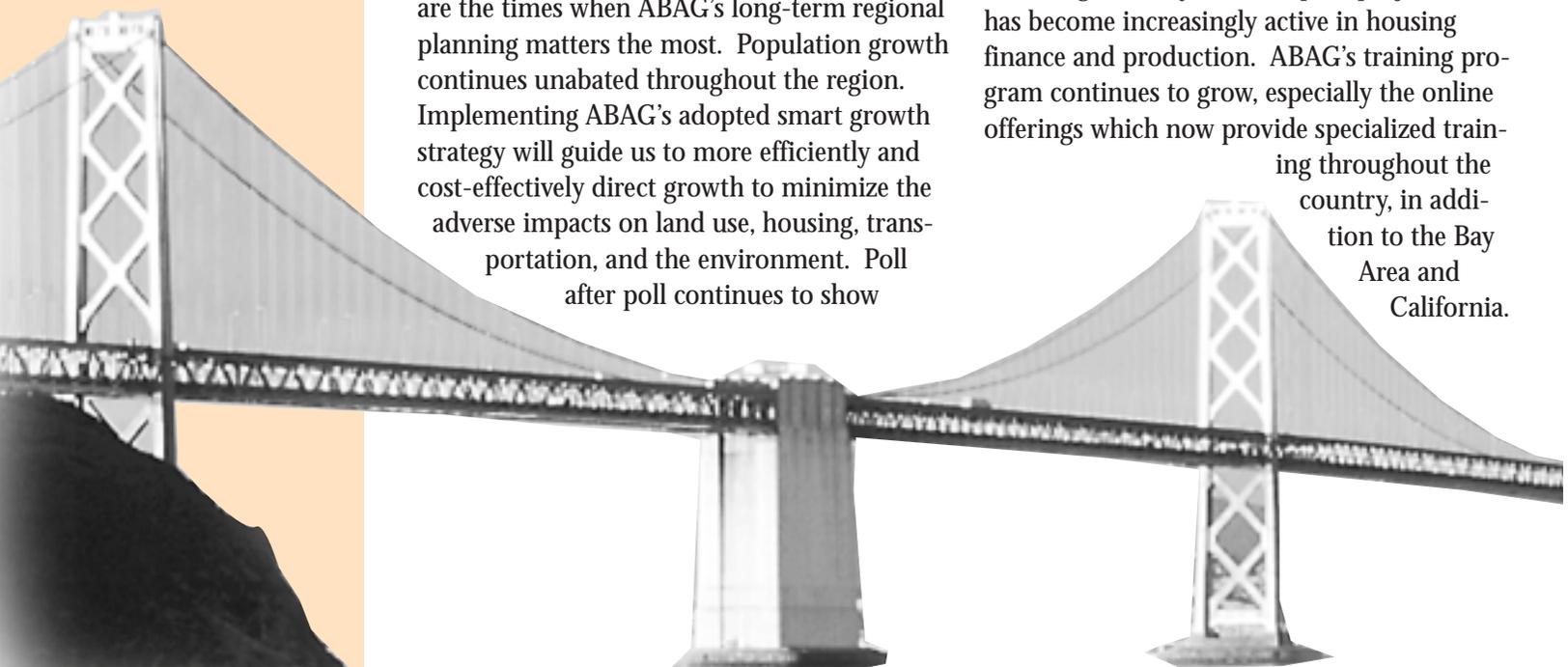
Ladies and Gentlemen:

As the New Year begins, the uncertainty that local governments face is unprecedented. Key federal legislation reauthorizing environmental and transportation programs are in limbo. Funds promised to carry out homeland security initiatives are significantly less than local agencies have expected. The state's budget situation is even worse. Despite the Governor and Legislature having agreed to a general framework for solving the state's projected deficit—\$15 billion bond, spending limits, and establishing a reserve fund—the devil is in the details. Unfortunately, nobody knows what the details are and what they may mean for city and county budgets this year or next. Later this month, the Governor will unveil his proposed budget for next year and it's widely expected that it will be hotly debated because of the cuts that will be necessary to match projected revenues with expenses. And lastly, even though the rest of the country and even parts of California are coming out of this most recent recession, the economic situation in the Bay Area remains depressed. This is especially true in the South Bay and high technology sectors of the regional economy.

As challenging as this backdrop may be, these are the times when ABAG's long-term regional planning matters the most. Population growth continues unabated throughout the region. Implementing ABAG's adopted smart growth strategy will guide us to more efficiently and cost-effectively direct growth to minimize the adverse impacts on land use, housing, transportation, and the environment. Poll after poll continues to show

strong public support for maintaining a clean environment, even if it means a slower growth in our economy. Continued implementation of programs such as the Comprehensive Conservation Management Plan (CCMP), which celebrated its 10th anniversary last year, will ensure further improvements in the San Francisco Bay's water quality. ABAG partners with many federal, state, regional, local agencies, and environmental organizations to carry out the CCMP's many programs and projects. Similarly, ABAG partners with the BAAQMD and MTC to prepare the region's air quality plans, which have led to marked improvements in the region's air quality problems. Recently, we achieved three years of ozone monitoring data within the limits of the federal standard, making the Bay Area the largest metropolitan region to have achieved such a status.

ABAG's service programs continue to make a difference to many of our members. In a commercial insurance environment which is highly volatile and increasingly expensive, ABAG PLAN continues to provide cost-effective liability, property, earthquake and public officials bond coverage. In this low interest rate environment, ABAG's financial services have helped many agencies refinance or secure financing for a myriad of capital projects and has become increasingly active in housing finance and production. ABAG's training program continues to grow, especially the online offerings which now provide specialized training throughout the country, in addition to the Bay Area and California.



Executive Board Highlights

These and other service programs are highlighted in this report and we welcome your agency's participation in programs that you may not currently be involved.

It is unclear when the financial uncertainties facing the region's towns, cities, and counties will be eliminated and budgets prepared with more certainty. Clearly, the ambiguities surrounding VLF, sales and property tax shares are troubling and unsettling. We fully recognize this. We continue to strive, as do you, to operate a lean and efficient organization. Next year, we project that member dues will comprise an even smaller portion of our total budget than they have during the last few years—less than 10%. Nonetheless, member dues are an important source of revenue for the agency since they are leveraged to match federal and state grants that require local matches. Depending on the programs, your dues may be leveraged 4-8 times in grant dollars received. This year, for the second year in a row, I am proposing **no increase** in the per capita dues rate. We all have to tighten our belts and ABAG will simply continue doing more with less, as will many of you.

We deeply and sincerely appreciate your ongoing support of ABAG and its many planning, service, and implementation programs. Dealing with the region's growth and associated impacts continues to be a daunting challenge. It is a privilege to partner with so many local, regional, other public and private and community organizations to improve the quality of life throughout the region. Indeed we thank you for allowing us to work with you and for the privilege of serving you.

FY 2002-03 was a busy and productive year for ABAG. While we endured the usual ups and downs of working in an environment of fiscal uncertainty and we may not have accomplished all of our goals, overall it was a good year.

We held two successful General Assemblies in the spring and fall, the theme of the former was, "Water and Land Use" and the latter, "Under Construction: Building a New Model of Comprehensive Regional Planning and Governance." Those in attendance at both General Assemblies were fully engaged in the lively discussions about issues that make a difference in the quality of service we provide to our communities and residents. Those of you who have not attended General Assemblies are encouraged to come and bring members of your staff. The next General Assembly and Business Meeting is scheduled for April 29, 2004, and will focus on the topic of housing and economic prosperity. These sessions are designed to benefit both staff and elected officials.

Seven members of ABAG's Executive Board (Gwen Regalia, Mark Green, Rose Jacobs Gibson, Steve Rabinowitsh, Pete McHugh, Jane Brunner, and Dave Cortese) and seven members of the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (Steve Kinsey, Sue Lempert, John McLemore, Jon Rubin, Mark DeSaulnier, Shelia Young, and Jim Spering—the latter three are also ABAG Executive Board members) met for six months to negotiate ways to better integrate land use and transportation planning in the region and to explore the issue of merger of the two agencies. While merger was not the outcome of the discussions, the Task Force agreed to establish a Joint Policy Committee. The new Joint Policy Committee will have the authority to comment on and review regional plans or strategies of each agency such as ABAG's Projections and MTC's Regional Transportation Plan, and will report directly to the Board and Commission. A planning staff person will be hired to staff the work of the joint committee. MTC has agreed to provide funding for this position for two years. You will hear more about the role of this committee as its scope of work is developed.

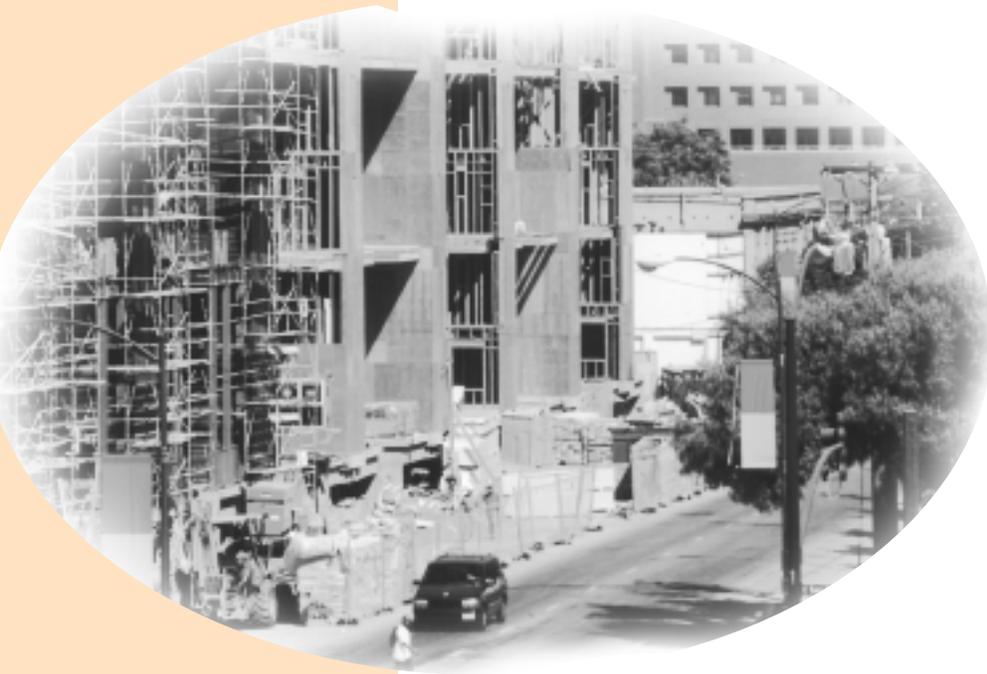

ABAG Planning Programs

ABAG is responsible for regional land use, housing and related planning activities for the nine counties and 101 cities, comprising the San Francisco Bay Area.

ABAG's efforts to develop and sustain an expanded planning program have never been more important as they are today. The need for comprehensive regional planning **within** the Bay Area is critical and, given the projected growth throughout the State, it is becoming equally important to more formally establish relationships and strategies **beyond** ABAG's traditional geographic area of responsibility.



As will be noted in the following pages in the discussions of ABAG's specific planning programs, our efforts and activities already have extended beyond the 9-county Bay Area. Furthermore, we continue to seek opportunities to integrate related social, economic, and environmental factors into our regional planning efforts.

Following is a discussion of the basic planning services provided by ABAG followed by descriptions of focused planning programs.

Regional Planning Committee

The Regional Planning Committee (RPC), as one of the Agency's standing committees, has representation from each county and a city representative from each county as well as

public and special interest representatives. The RPC hears issues of regional concern covering all planning issues and makes recommendations to the ABAG Executive Board on programs and activities the Agency should undertake.

In Fiscal Year 2004-05 the RPC will continue to make recommendations regarding regional planning programs with special attention paid to ABAG's Smart Growth Implementation and Housing Programs.

Regional Airport Planning Committee

The Regional Airport Planning Committee (RAPC) is a joint committee of ABAG, the Metropolitan Transportation Commission, and the Bay Conservation and Development Commission, tasked with oversight of the preparation of the Regional Airport Systems Plan, which then becomes part of the Regional Transportation Plan. RAPC also provides a venue for discussion of land use and environmental issues related to airports.

In Fiscal Year 2004-05 ABAG will continue to support the RAPC with special attention being paid to expanding the Airport Land Use Compatibility activities, building stronger relationships with jurisdictions with airport land use issues, and improving the dialogue about aircraft overflight noise.

Regional Agency Coordinating Committee

The Regional Agency Coordinating Committee (RACC) is a joint committee of ABAG, MTC, and the Bay Air Quality Management District tasked primarily with oversight of the preparation of the Bay Area's Air Plan and conformance activities. The function of the RACC was expanded in Fiscal Year 2003 with the addition of Smart Growth activities as one of its areas of focus and representation from BCDC, the Regional Water Quality Control Board, and the Bay Area Alliance for Sustainable Communities sharing the Smart Growth responsibility.

In Fiscal Year 2004-05 ABAG will continue to support the RACC and will provide primary administrative support to the committee.

Clearinghouse Activities

ABAG provides information to public and private agencies and the public related to public capital improvement projects and their potential environmental impacts. In particular, it is ABAG's responsibility to circulate for public review documents relating to infrastructure improvements for which federal funds are received. Currently, available funding allows only minimal clearinghouse activities.

In Fiscal Year 2004-05 ABAG will look to expand its clearinghouse functions, funding permitted, to include on-line tracking and research of public projects and to allow for ABAG planners to perform a review of projects and their potential impacts.

Housing

ABAG's Housing activities are diverse, entrepreneurial and opportunistic and elements are found in almost all of the individual Planning Programs (discussed in the following pages). Activities such as the following have been shaped by a special "Housing Committee" of the RPC:

- Convening a working group to develop a regional standard for counting housing development successes, with the long-term goal of having the State adopt a locally supported standard.
- Participating in State level negotiations and working group activities to improve the Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) process and Housing Element Law.
- Focusing on specific housing issues through workshops involving staff of cities and counties and housing proponents and officials.

In Fiscal Year 2004-05 ABAG will continue to focus on housing, carrying out a balanced, proactive program aimed at supporting legislative efforts that facilitate housing development, seeking state and regional incentives to encourage housing construction, and promoting best practices among local jurisdictions to shift the public's perception of infill and multi-family housing.



Intergovernmental Coordination and Research and Analysis

In addition to the individual activities described above and on the following pages, ABAG's Planning Program on an on-going basis supports other ABAG activities. In particular, planning staff works closely with ABAG's Communication Group to provide information to local appointed and elected officials through activities such as local Mayors' Conferences and cities associations, and ABAG's Legislation and Governmental Organization Committee and Executive Board. Planning staff also works closely with staff of the Research and Analysis program, both in data and mapping related work.

In Fiscal Year 2004-05 ABAG planning staff will continue to provide support to other programs and activities within the Agency.

ABAG Projections will impact regional plans and planning throughout the Bay Area. ABAG, the Metropolitan Transportation Commission, and the Bay Area Air Quality Management District all incorporate ABAG projections, particularly for jobs, households, and population.

Bay Area Alliance for Sustainable Communities

ABAG represents cities, counties, and regional agencies on the Steering Committee of the Bay Area Alliance for Sustainable Communities (Bay Area Alliance).

Since 1997, the Bay Area Alliance has brought together government and private sector leaders who represent the economy, environment,

The CCII brings Bay Area Alliance members into partnership with residents to attract private investment to economically disadvantaged neighborhoods. Over \$150,000,000 in capital has been committed and more than \$40 million dollars invested to date in projects in Marin City, Oakland, Richmond, San Francisco, San Jose, and Vallejo. The CCII helps to fund needed projects and provides practical lessons on how to revitalize communities.

To complement these and other implementation efforts, the Bay Area Alliance published an inaugural regional *Indicators* report that will be updated regularly to track progress towards achieving the vision, and the first installment of *Faces of Sustainability*, which highlights sustainable practices in Napa County. and social equity. The coalition developed the *Compact for a Sustainable Bay Area* (Compact), which articulates a regional vision and recommends strategies to address growth-related challenges. The *Compact* is intended to guide government, employers, civic organizations, and individuals in efforts to achieve and maintain a prosperous economy, quality environment, and social equity. To implement the *Compact*, the Bay Area Alliance has initiated two exciting projects: the Bay Area Regional Livability Footprint Project and the Community Capital Investment Initiative (CCII).

Through the Livability Footprint, the Bay Area Alliance promotes smarter land use. A series of Smart Growth Conversations yielded valuable insights on the incentives and policy changes needed to implement smarter growth. By featuring jurisdictions' smart growth efforts at its quarterly meetings, the coalition recognizes their efforts and demonstrates the value of infill and other smart growth techniques.

During Fiscal Year 2004-05 ABAG will continue in a leadership role as the Bay Area Alliance focuses more intensively on implementing the Compact. The coalition will:

- Use the Compact as an outreach and advocacy tool to improve understanding of sustainability principles.
- Continue work on the Regional Livability Footprint, with particular attention to gaining policy changes and incentives to promote Smart Growth.
- Invest in additional community revitalization projects through the CCII.
- Publish new installments of *Faces of Sustainability* featuring other Bay Area counties. Collect information to expand upon and update the sustainable development indicators.

San Francisco Bay Trail

The San Francisco Bay Trail is a continuous, multi-use shoreline path that is now about half complete. When fully complete, it will cross seven Bay Area toll bridges and connect nine counties, 47 shoreline cities, and over 130 local, regional, and state parks. Bay Trail benefits include transportation, recreation, exercise, community connections and opportunities for wildlife viewing, education, and environmental stewardship. ABAG administers the Bay Trail Project that plans, promotes and advocates for implementation. Project staff provide regional oversight and coordination, technical assistance, education and outreach, and seek funding for planning, design, construction, and maintenance.

Major accomplishments last year include publishing new user-friendly Bay Trail maps, administration of about 45 Bay Trail planning, design and construction grants, initiation of a comprehensive analysis of outstanding trail gaps, oversight of the Data Entry and Statistical Analysis phase of the independent scientific Wildlife and Public Access Study, outreach to the media including a week-long *Bay Trail Adventure* series conducted in partnership with the San Francisco Chronicle and on KPIX Channel 5, and coordinating on trail construction and dedications in communities throughout the region.

Work Plan for Fiscal Year 2004-05

- Administer approximately 45 Bay Trail Grants and seek new funds to continue the grant program.
- Pursue short and long-term funding strategies for project administration, trail development and maintenance.
- Complete a Comprehensive Bay Trail Gap Analysis and create a Strategic Framework for Build-out.
- Oversee the final reporting phase for the Wildlife and Public Access Study and coordinate with the Bay Conservation and Development Commission (BCDC), researchers, Bay Trail Directors, and other stakeholders on a new study design for a third year of scientific field research.
- Advocate bicycle and pedestrian access to and across Bay Area toll bridges, including the west span of the Bay and the Richmond/ San Rafael bridges and safe and seamless connections to the Carquinez, Benicia/Martinez, and East Span Bay bridges.
- Publish the *Bay Trail Rider* newsletter, manage GIS layers and create a data base with information on Bay Trail "gaps," maintain and update web site and internet postings, meet regularly with elected officials, agency and local government staff, and media contacts, and plan and host trail dedications and other public events.

The Hazardous Waste Management Facility Allocation Committee develops and oversees annual implementation of a "fair-share" facility allocation process, coordinates the Bay Area Green Business Program, and directs other source reduction activities.

agencies have achieved "green" certification. The Program is offered in Alameda, Contra Costa, Marin, Napa, San Francisco, Santa Clara, and Sonoma counties. In December 2002 the Program won a prestigious Governor's Award for Environmental and

Economic Leadership. The Program is expanding throughout California and will soon be available in San Diego, Santa Cruz/Monterey, and Sacramento counties. Arizona and Hawaii also now offer the Green Business Program.

Each year ABAG analyzes data on hazardous waste generated in the region, applies the capacity allocation formula, and develops recommendations for Committee review. This process maintains the currency of regional hazardous waste planning and identifies waste generation trends and source reduction opportunities. A special study initiated in 2003 will update the underlying information and assumptions about existing hazardous waste management facilities.

To promote more environmentally responsible business practices, the Committee launched the Bay Area Green Business Program (www.greenbiz.abag.ca.gov) which assists and certifies businesses that comply with all environmental regulations and then voluntarily meet additional solid waste reduction, pollution prevention, and resource conservation standards. Since 1996, over 325 businesses in 20 different industries and numerous public

ABAG / CALFED Task Force

The current ABAG/CALFED Task Force work is cutting edge, as we explore regional models for the development of an Integrated Regional Water Management Plan, (IRWMP). An IRWMP is now required by the State of California to receive certain types of funding from important voter approved bond measures, and to ensure that regions are doing what they can to become less reliant on the State Water Project. The Task Force area of interest is very large—encompassing a nine-county region of nearly 7,000 square miles, with a multiplicity of land uses, a wide variety of water uses and water supplies, a fast growing set of urban and suburban areas, well established agricultural uses, a burgeoning wetlands and watershed conservation effort, and over eighty water wholesalers and retailers.

Within a consensus-based stakeholder framework, the Task Force has begun to identify ways to meet the following regional water challenges: 1) the integration of water planning and management with regional and local land use planning, 2) water system reliability in a geologically unstable part of the state where infrastructure is aging, 3) ways to integrate flood control, watershed and wetlands restoration projects, 4) ways to integrate wastewater management, ecosystem restoration and water supply planning, 5) achieving greater water use efficiencies in all categories of water use, 6) describing the Bay Area's regional water need and water balance, 7) balancing human and environmental water needs, and fully describing and assessing each, 8) reducing reliance on imported water, finding responses to water storage limitations and droughts in a variety of sub-regions, 9) developing a regional approach to meeting future water needs under a variety of regional development, growth and conservation scenarios, and 10) developing new inter-regional dialogues that acknowledge the Bay Region's reliance on imported water supplies.

The Task Force has been successful in bringing together disparate interests, developing a regional exchange of ideas and information, linking land use planning to water planning, and linking the Bay region to the state's water planning efforts. The Task Force serves as a spawning ground for ideas like desalination to address pressing Marin County water needs,

regional water sustainability programs, and integrated regional water management planning approaches. The Task Force advocates for the Bay-Delta Record of Decision and its funding and implementation at federal, state and local levels. The Task Force has developed a web site of information that serves as an information hub for the region and its localities.

San Francisco Estuary Project

Hosting a rich diversity of flora and fauna, the Estuary includes 1,600 square miles, drains more than 40% of the state, provides drinking water to 22 million Californians, and irrigates 4.5 million acres of farmland. It also allows the nation's fourth largest metropolitan region to pursue diverse activities, including shipping, fishing, recreation, and commerce.

The San Francisco Estuary Project celebrated the tenth anniversary of the *Comprehensive Conservation and Management Plan (CCMP)* with a celebration of accomplishments at the 6th Biennial State of the Estuary Conference in October 2003 with over 800 attendees from local, state, and federal agencies, interested scientists, media and the general public. The Estuary Project also sponsored the 2nd Biennial CALFED Science Conference in January 2003 held in Sacramento with over 1,100 attendees. During 2003 the Estuary Project provided technical and public outreach assistance to the San Francisco Bay Area Wetlands Restoration Program as well as contract management and technical support services for the California Bay-Delta Authority's Science and Drinking Water Quality Programs. The Estuary Project also continued its highly successful erosion control workshops, updated and distributed guides, manuals, videos and other public outreach materials for Best Management Practices (BMP) in stormwater controls, continued the JARPA multi-agency permit center, continued the successful Boater Education Program to reduce pollution, and distributed \$111,000 through its Small Grants Program for restoration and education projects around the Estuary.

Workplan for Fiscal Year 2004-05

This year the Estuary Project will continue its partnership efforts to improve the water quality in the San Francisco Bay and further educate decision makers and the public about the need to restore and protect the Bay-Delta Estuary. Projects next year will include:

- Providing contract management, administrative and technical support to the CALFED Bay-Delta Science Program and the Drinking Water Quality Program, including organizational support for a 3-day science conference October 4-6, 2004.
- Work with the San Francisco Estuary Institute and other partners on two projects, continue coordination efforts to agree on a strategy to develop a suite of ecosystem indicators for the Estuary in 2004 and continue work on developing a wetlands regional monitoring program for the Estuary.
- Provide education and outreach to the public about the need to prevent the introduction and spread of invasive species to the Estuary.
- Under a State Proposition 13 grant, continue working with the Brake Pad partnership, to implement the project to identify and prevent impacts on surface water quality that may be caused by the use of automotive brake pads and continue to seek additional funding for related studies.
- Under two State Proposition 13 funded Pesticide Research and Identification of Source and Mitigation grants, begin work for Urban Pesticides Pollution Prevention and Tools for Surface Water Monitoring projects.
- Continue to provide technical and communication assistance to the Regional Water Quality Control Board including the TMDL Process, and oversight of Supplemental Environmental Projects for Administrative Civil Liability fines, and other cooperative endeavors.
- Produce and distribute six issues (3500 copies/each issue) of *Estuary* newsletter.
- Conduct education and outreach for the National Estuary Campaign: "What's an Estuary? Now You Know." For more information on the campaign, log on to www.WhatsAnEstuary.com.

Earthquake Preparedness

With funding from the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS), ABAG developed the *Home Quake Safety Toolkit*, located at <http://quake.abag.ca.gov/fixit>. This site includes sections on both structural and non-structural hazards and mitigation, as well as on family disaster plans. The structures section includes an innovative quiz to “self-assess” structural vulnerability based on shaking intensity and structural type. Structural retrofit resources include information on the retrofit process; lists of contractors, engineers, and home inspectors; success stories and available funds. The nonstructural section includes a non-threatening user-friendly quiz on causes of contents damage, ways to anchor contents, and chimney safety. In the third section, infrastructure disruptions and liquefaction are creatively explained using a quiz focusing on emergency planning. How-to planning resources focus on family emergency plans, emergency supplies, and natural gas safety. This toolkit was released in October 2003.

ABAG is developing *Tools for Businesses to Tame Disaster*, also with USGS funding. This web site includes several resources for small businesses that are multi-hazard in focus, particularly those dealing with speeding business recovery. Others tools focus on increasing employee and customer safety during earthquakes. Recovery tools focus on strategies to manage business disruption, a plan for transportation and utility disruption, and a plan for reoccupying buildings. Safety tools include information on bracing and anchoring building contents, natural gas safety, special hazardous materials issues, tort liability, and calculating benefits and costs of mitigation. *The toolkit will be officially released in the spring of 2004.*

- ABAG's October 2004 General Assembly will focus on commemorating the 15th anniversary of the Loma Prieta earthquake by focusing on the lessons learned and future of multi-hazard mitigation planning.
- ABAG will begin the development of coordinated disaster and risk management planning for the greater Bay Area airports. (FAA grant application submitted.)
- ABAG will begin development of a multi-hazard, multi-jurisdiction, hazard mitigation plan for the region and applicable to cities and counties. (FEMA grant application submitted).

Data and Analysis

Projections 2003 estimates 126,350 incremental housing units above previous forecasts

ABAG's forecasting work underwent a fundamental change in 2003. Unlike previous forecasts, *Projections 2003* was a policy based scenario that described a "smart growth" land use scenario and a more aggressive level of housing production. Previous forecasts had always used local general plans and zoning information as a measure of development potential. *Projections 2003* used information derived from regional smart growth.

The fundamental changes to our Projections forecast caused us to produce some supporting documentation in our *Projections 2003: A Smart Growth Forecast Technical Appendix*. Our basic model documentation was also updated with the publication of *HENRY: a Regional Simulation System for Demographic-Economic Modeling*.

We continued to hold our well respected short-term forecasting conference, Focus 2003-2004, and provide supporting documentation to conference participants. We have also increased our efforts to forecast retail sales tax revenues. We now provide separate annual retail sales tax forecast to MTC.

2003 also saw a comprehensive update of our existing land-use database, as well as planning and conducting a variety of workshops and products related to census data.

During Fiscal Year 2004-05 We expect to complete Projections 2005, returning to the traditional December release of that document. We will also update documents describing our Input-Output model, our land-use database and survey work, and the Projective Optimization Land Use Information System (POLIS) model that geographically allocates our forecast to local areas.

ABAG POWER

ABAG Publicly Owned Energy Resources (ABAG POWER) is a separate joint powers agency (JPA) formed under ABAG to acquire energy on behalf of local governments, as well as provide energy management and telecommunication services. ABAG POWER currently offers natural gas aggregation to 39 local governments and special districts in the PG&E service territory. ABAG POWER provides a public sector approach to pooled purchasing, and each public agency is guaranteed a voice in program operations and decisions through its representative to the ABAG POWER Board of Directors and Executive Committee. ABAG POWER is also working on plans to expand energy conservation services to local jurisdictions through implementation of energy efficiency and energy management programs.

Gas Aggregation Program

The natural gas purchasing pool has now completed its seventh year of operation. ABAG POWER purchases natural gas on agencies' behalf and arranges for it to be delivered to the PG&E system for distribution to members. The goal of ABAG POWER's Natural Gas Program is to provide both cost savings and price stability. This goal is different from that of PG&E which is incentivized only to provide low cost gas on a near-term (monthly) basis.

During the last year:

- ABAG POWER bifurcated its gas supply and gas scheduling functions, and added new service providers to achieve more competitive pricing in its purchases. In addition, the program has expanded its potential gas suppliers to include Occidental Energy Marketing (subsidiary of Occidental Petroleum), Coral Energy (part of Shell trading network), and BP Energy.
- ABAG POWER has continued to stabilize its gas prices by layering in longer-term gas purchases, with the alternate objective of diversifying its gas purchase portfolio. In the future, there are many factors that could again cause significant price volatility, including: abnormal weather patterns, increased demand from gas-powered generators, and restrictions in gas transportation capacity and/or imports.

ABAG POWER's gas program continues to be primarily for "Core" customers, although ABAG POWER has the ability and desire to also serve "Noncore" customers (large users). If qualified, noncore customers can take advantage of lower gas transportation rates that are not available to PG&E customers.

During Fiscal Year 2004-05

We will continue to explore various energy purchasing strategies that will increase price stability. In addition, we intend to propose programs with the potential to help members reduce energy costs further through energy conservation and usage management.

ABAG PLAN Corporation

ABAG PLAN's new web-based sewer backup homeowner awareness program has brought more than 270,000 visitors to www.sewersmart.org.

Since 1985, a time of crisis for local governments due to a lack of affordable insurance, ABAG has provided risk management and insurance services to local governments. The results have been impressive, with the ABAG PLAN Corporation now providing property and liability insurance to 31 cities and towns in the Bay Area. The PLAN has grown to achieve assets in excess of \$40 million and has returned over \$20 million to its members in dividends. In addition, the SHARP pool has been providing affordable Workers Compensation insurance to member cities and districts, especially important in this time of double and triple-digit increases in premiums.

Highlights and anticipated achievements for Fiscal Year 2004-05 include:

- Expansion of sewer loss prevention program

ABAG Financial Services

ABAG Financial Services Programs provide convenient, cost saving, and secure means to meet the broad array of capital financing needs of public agencies and their nonprofit partners serving the public interest. The Agency has provided nearly \$4 billion in low cost capital financing for projects in more than 150 local jurisdictions. Beyond the direct savings afforded to borrowers utilizing these programs, residents in ABAG Member communities benefit from Agency financing projects in many ways. Recent projects include construction of new hospitals and clinics (such as Oakland Children's Hospital expansion), mass transit system development (Bay Area Rapid Transit to the San Francisco Airport), as well as the funding of new modular classrooms to accommodate growing school attendance.

Agency-issued financing projects also include provision for construction and preservation of more than 7,500 units in fifty-three affordable apartment communities including The Crossing in the City of San Bruno.

The Agency will also continue to offer the California Redevelopment Agency Pool (Cal-Rap), its industry leading tax-allocation bond product as well as its credit-enhanced, pooled financing vehicle for Water and Wastewater Districts. Both of these financing pools provide easy access and low cost funding for the smaller borrowing needs of special districts in the Agency's member jurisdictions.

ABAG Training Center

The ABAG Training Center has been an ABAG service program since 1979, created to provide economical alternatives for local government employees to obtain professional development training. Course offerings were in the fields of management, environmental planning, housing, and computer technology.

Through the intervening years, the training needs of our members changed. There arose a demand for practical and certificate courses in worker safety, hazardous waste management, pollution prevention, and computer technology. Currently, the overwhelming majority of our courses are Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) required safety training. Annual classes in earthquake mitigation and pollution prevention are still offered.

Originally the ABAG Training Center (now a program of ABAG, Inc.) conducted classes in our offices and hotel meeting rooms. Annual student attendance was on the order of 600-700 students, limited by the distance to attend a class in Oakland. The development of the Internet allowed us to reach students throughout the entire country. Increasing our business client base provided a means to support continued training of our members' employees at a significantly reduced price.

The first online course was an OSHA-required Hazardous Waste Operations Refresher offered through www.hazmatschool.com in June 1999. During the fiscal year 1999-2000 we served 125

online students, including students from Alaska and Nebraska. In 2002-2003 the ABAG Training Center served 3,740 students, exceeding 9,700 since we first offered online training.

In 2002, ABAG was reviewed and approved as an authorized Continuing Education Unit (CEU) provider member of the International Association for Continuing Education and Training (IACET). Now any ABAG Training Center/Hazmat School student or potential student can be assured that our courses meet the stringent IACET criteria.

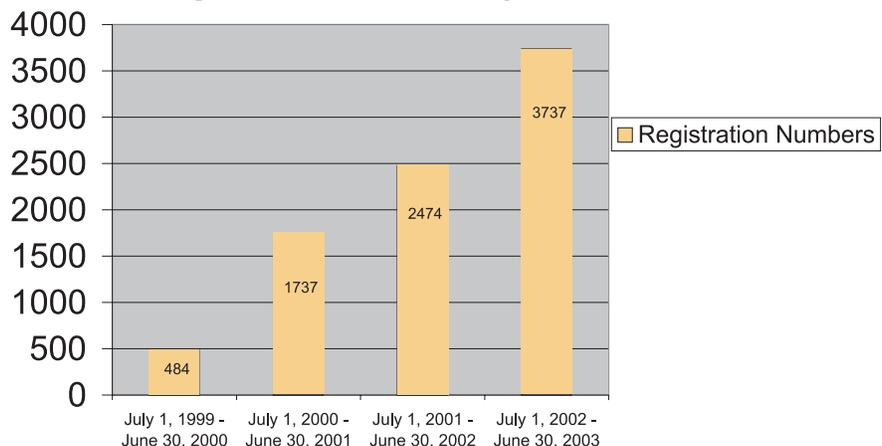
The ABAG Training Center also sponsors special workshops and conferences selected to meet the needs of local governments. In October 2004, in partnership with the Bay Area Economic Forum, we will present a two-day conference and exposition on homeland security and disaster mitigation, with special attention to impacts at the local and regional levels.

As always, employees of ABAG members receive a 20 percent discount on the price of ABAG Training Center offerings, and a 25 percent discount for 30 employees or more.

Access to bay area governments Online (abagOnline)

In 1994, ABAG published on the Internet a set of documents describing the organization and our programs. Named abagOnline for “access to bay area governments Online,” our site on the World Wide Web, <http://www.abag.ca.gov>, was a first for a Council of Governments and the second for a California public agency. Ten years later, it is rare for a public agency or local government not to have a presence on the Internet.

As of the end of 2003, ABAG and its programs received over 1.6 million page views and 180,000 visitor sessions per month. abagOnline offers a wealth of information about the full range of our planning and service programs, including earthquake mitigation and hazard maps, Bay Trail maps, the Green Business Program, the San Francisco Estuary Program, ABAG Financial Services, ABAG Power, and the Smart Growth Initiative. abagOnline has greatly expanded our ability to reach and help citizens throughout the San Francisco Bay Region.

Another innovation is our online Geographical Information System (GIS), that allows the public to find statistical and economic data by pointing and clicking locations on maps. The GIS program is constantly being updated and expanded as more data sources are uncovered and added.

ABAG offers Internet hosting to our members at a discount and to other public agencies. Our hosted clients currently number 30. Clients can completely avoid the bother and expense associated with assembling and maintaining web servers and Internet domains, and can concentrate their resources on developing content for their constituents. ABAG has developed a suite of tools which simplify management of web content and allow our members' clerical staff to update and maintain their web presence. ABAG has also created custom web sites for clients such as San Francisco Bay Water Transit Authority, the CALFED Science program, the cities of Fairfax and Belvedere, and the Delta Diablo Sanitation District. ABAG also provides web hosting and infrastructure support for the

Metropolitan Transportation Commission's online programs.

Electronic communications with our members via the internet are becoming very popular. The ABAG CALFED Task Force receives agendas, meeting notices, minutes, and messages exclusively via email. Significant savings are realized over the conventional use of regular mail, and documents can reach intended recipients within minutes. Email-based electronic distribution lists are among the services offered to our member hosted agencies.

To better serve our clients with publication purchase, class or workshop registration, ABAG has used an electronic merchant software system. This level of automation and service integration has enabled ABAG to handle many more requests for documents or registrations with no increase in staffing.

Joint Powers Agreements Serving Local Government

ABAG and the City of San Carlos have entered into an agreement to provide much needed service to local governments and other public agencies throughout the region. Since 2001 two innovative joint powers agreements—Regional Government Services (RGS) and Local Government Services (LGS) have been in

business to provide needed personnel and other administrative services to other public agencies. RGS and LGS are providers of “one-stop” administrative services that enable small agencies to focus their efforts on accomplishing their core mission. Local and regional agencies benefit from a partnership with RGS and LGS by working with public agencies that understand and work within the unique public agency environment, are

independent and assist in implementing operational objectives, purchasing only the level of services needed, avoiding adding on-going, unneeded capacity, and paying only the cost of services provided (without paying the profits a private company would expect to receive). The level of services provided can quickly ramp up or down to meet the needs of the agency. Both RGS and LGS are skilled in recruiting and retaining highly qualified personnel by offering challenging assignments and flexible retirement programs. LGS contracts with the California Public Employees Retirement System (PERS) for a defined benefit retirement program. RGS provides a 401(a) defined contribution retirement program.

Among the JPA's clients are the CalFed Science Program, San Francisco Bay Area Water Transit Authority, San Mateo County/Cities Association of Governments, and the Transbay Joint Powers Authority.

Legislative Activities

Monitoring state legislation that will benefit the Bay Area region and local jurisdictions and the communities it serves is an important function of the ABAG Legislation and Governmental Organization (L&GO) Committee. Under the shadow of state fiscal crisis and budget deficit, the L&GO Committee reviewed and monitored in 2003 more than 50 bills, propositions, and resolutions related to land-use, housing, fiscal policy, and environmental issues. Many letters of support and opposition were written to assembly members, senators, the governor, and the media expressing the Bay Area's legislative priorities, advising on the budget process, advocating the restoration of Vehicle License Fees and protection of redevelopment funding.

The Committee, composed of elected officials throughout the region, closely monitored legislation related to regional housing needs and planning practices, smart growth policies, the Inter-Regional Partnership, housing as second units and down payment assistance, incentive grant programs, earthquake retrofit and building standards, infrastructure planning and investment, sales taxes related to transportation and smart growth, financial assistance for relocation of car dealerships and big box retailers, pollution prevention and e-waste, consumer financial privacy, integrated regional water management planning, and other water quality issues.

During Fiscal Year 2004-05

The L&GO Committee will scrutinize during the 2004 Legislative Session bills and propositions related to local government financing and fiscal reform, land use and housing, water planning, and the environment. The Committee's priority is to help ensure that the Bay Area's needs are represented in legislative planning, weighing in on bills that it supports and working to amend the bills it opposes.

- The Committee will monitor fiscal reform strategies and continue support of the proposed 2004 statewide ballot initiative to limit state government's ability to confiscate local tax funds.
- The Committee voted support in 2003, looking ahead to the 2004 Legislative Session, to pursue smart growth planning incentives and regulatory changes related to urban growth boundaries, tax increment financing, and priority state competitive grant eligibility for cities who have adopted model "smart growth" policies.
- The Committee will also track bills and initiatives that contain mandates for local government, the lowering of voter approval requirement from two thirds to a majority, integrated regional planning, water planning funding, and reform plans for the state budget process.



Communications

ABAG's member-based services and assistance are vital to local governments who are being asked to provide more and more with less and less. The importance of communication during this regional problem solving is critical. Closing the communications gap to bring ABAG services and activities to the attention of our members and the public is the role of the Communications Department.

The Communications team skillfully brought these services to the forefront in 2002-2003. Most significantly during 2003, the Communications Department produced and managed special online reports involving Financial Privacy legislation and other timely subjects, planned and managed two general

assemblies and other special workshops, and conducted briefing for international delegations from China, Japan, Turkey, and Mexico.

The Communications team worked extensively with the media to disseminate information: conducting special briefings and press conferences on Projections 2003, short term economic forecasts, smart growth, earthquake research findings, sewers and risk management, housing initiatives; issuing regular press releases; and handling daily media information queries. Communication outreach included publishing topical, well-designed reports and newsletters, and providing and managing news information online.

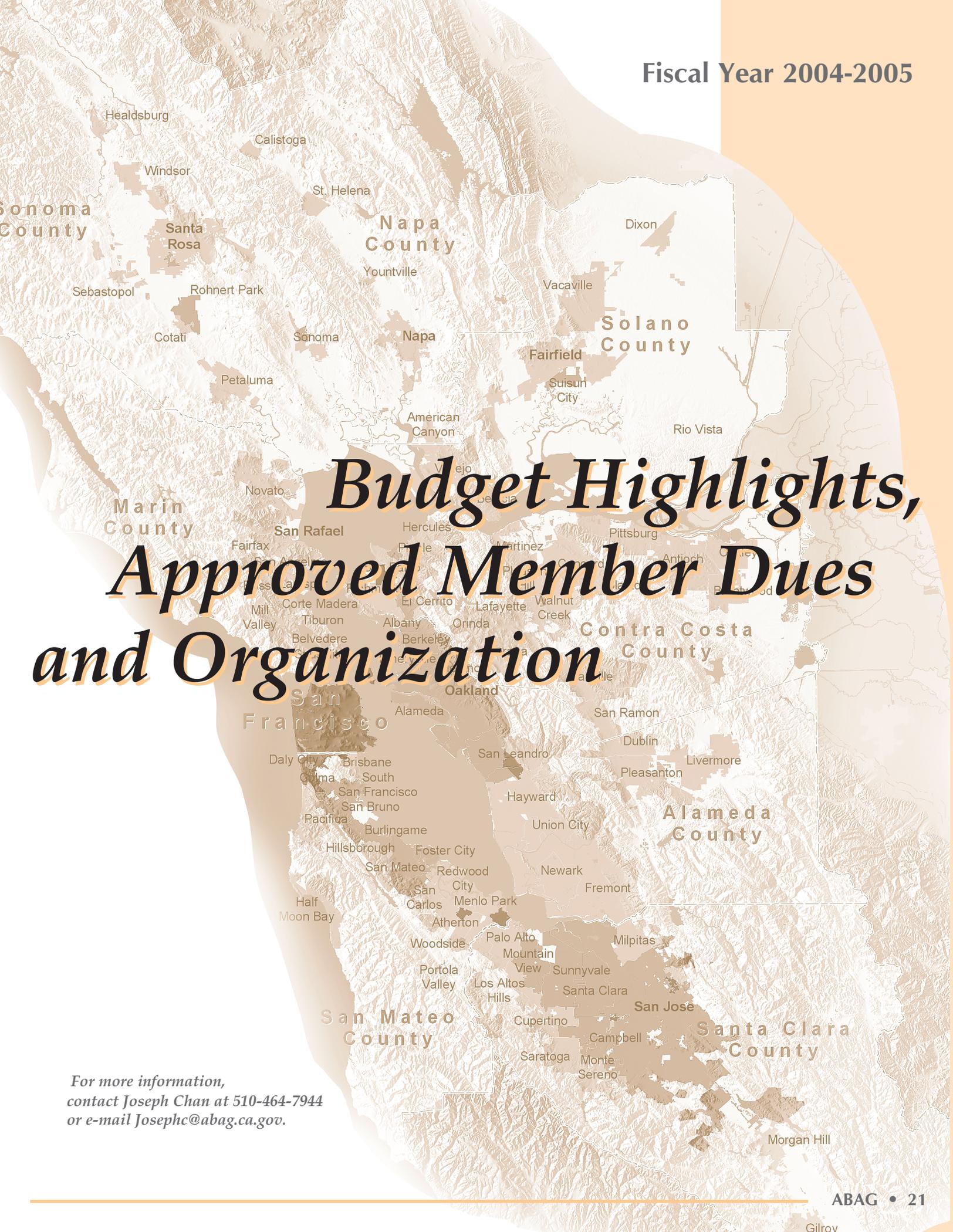
During Fiscal Year 2004-05

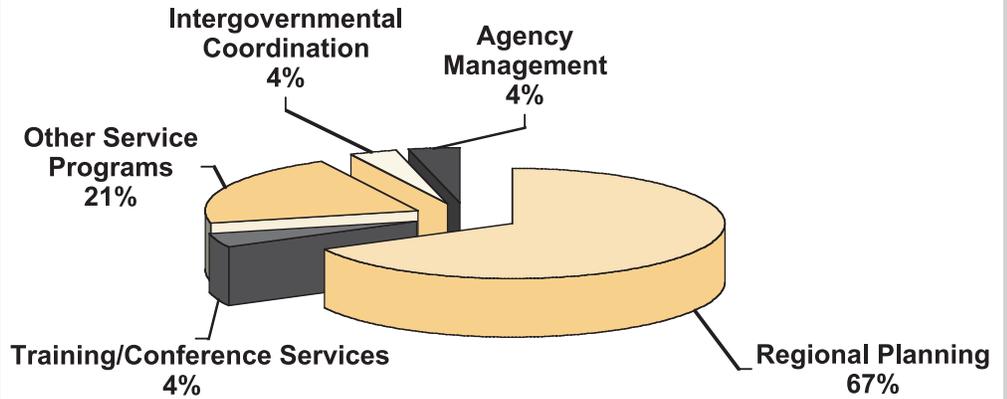


Budget Highlights, Approved Member Dues and Organization

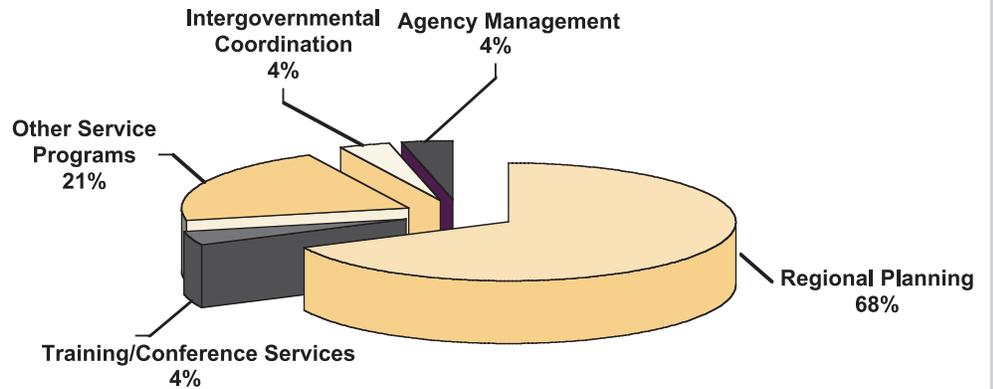
Summary of Revenue and Expenses by Program Group

Revenue by Program Group



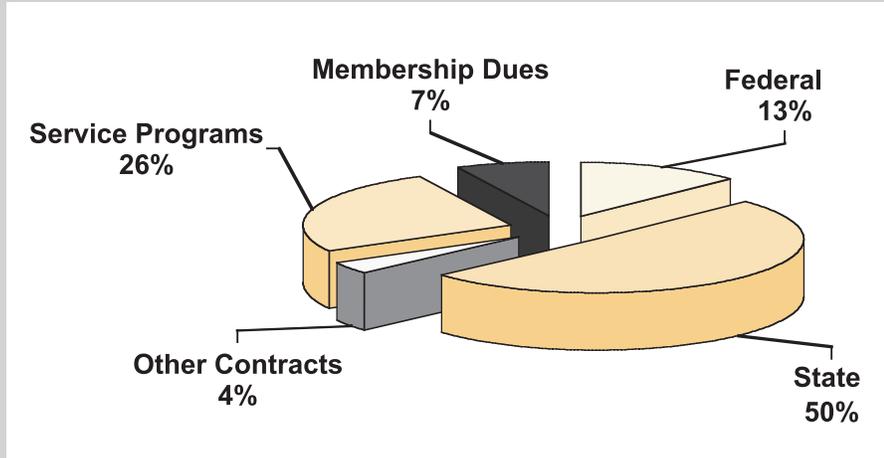

Expenditures by Program Group



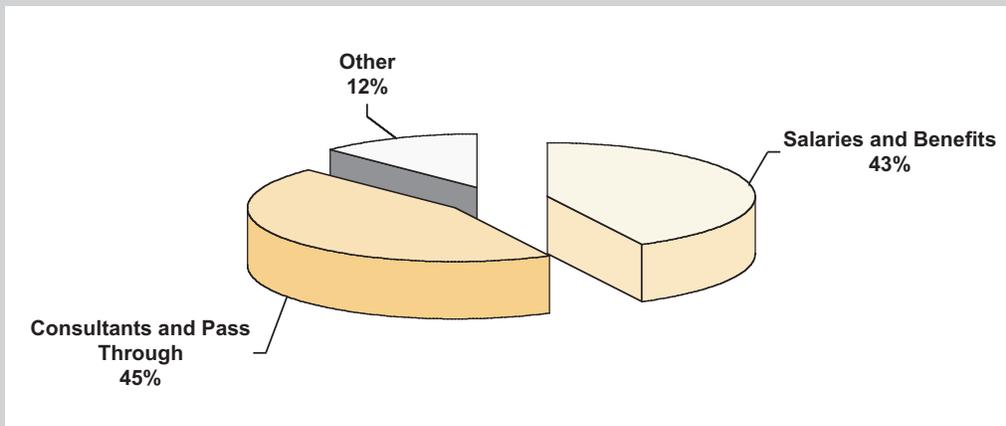

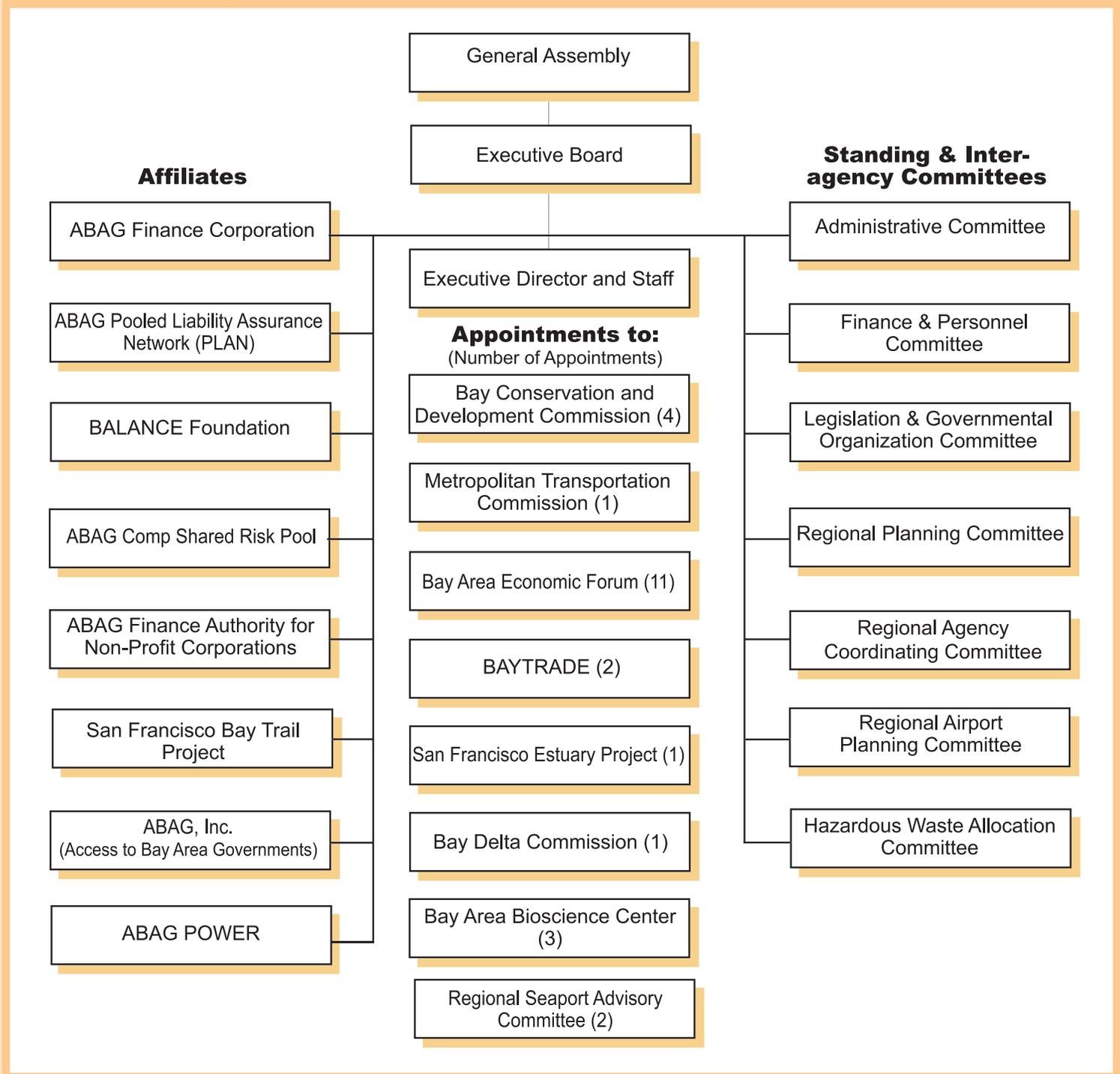

ABAG Organizational Structure

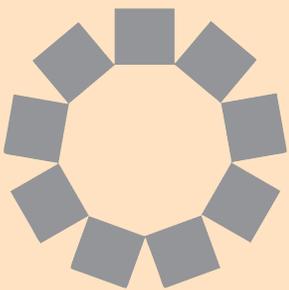

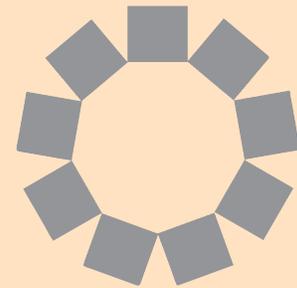
