Christchurch, New Zealand

Direct economic losses will exceed \$120 billion in a large Bay Area earthquake



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Loma Prieta Earthquake

In the next earthquake 2/3 of damaged housing will be multi-family



Chile Earthquake, 2010

In a large Bay Area earthquake damage to roads and bridges will take months or years to repair, especially in liquefaction areas



Christchurch, New Zealand

30 days after a large Bay Area earthquake 256,000 residents will still be without potable water and 59,000 will be without power



Great San Francisco Earthquake, 1906

San Francisco's city hall as well as many other public facilities have been retrofitted to a high standard and will perform well in the next earthquake

Bay Area Coordination Options

- What can local governments coordinate on **now** to promote a region-wide recovery after a major disaster?
 - Coordination for restoration of regional infrastructure
- Can Bay Area cities develop shared recovery actions to collectively negotiate with state and federal assistance agencies after the next disaster?
 - Joint legislative advocacy
 - Regulatory reform
- How will we support local community efforts to rebuild a resilient Bay Area?
 - Economic prosperity through defined housing recovery & job creation plans
 - Climate sustainability & disaster resilient development
